# **TMA Distinguished Service Award**

# TMA Honors Dr. Robert T. Gunby Jr.

The recipient of this year's Distinguished Service Award is Robert T. Gunby Jr., MD, of Dallas. The award will be presented Saturday, May 6, at 9:15 am, during the business session of the House of Delegates.

Dr. Gunby is a board-certified obstetrician gynecologist who has been active in organized medicine for four decades. He received his medical degree from the Medical College of Georgia in 1971, where he was elected into Alpha Omega Alpha, the national honor medical society. Dr. Gunby completed his internship and residency at Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas. He joined the Dallas County Medical Society (DCMS), the Texas Medical Association (TMA), and the American Medical Association (AMA) in 1977.

Dr. Gunby was elected TMA president in 2005-06. He served as member and chair of the TMA Council on Socioeconomics, where he met with insurance carriers to seek fair treatment for physicians. He served as a member of the TMA Committee on Access to Health Care, and as chair of TEXPAC, as well as TEXPAC district chair and vice chair.


In 1998, Dr. Gunby was elected president of DCMS. During his tenure, he led physicians' response to problems in negotiating with insurance providers. Dr. Gunby played a major role in the Texas Legislature's ultimate passage of a physician negotiation bill, which was designed to restore fairness in the contracting process.

Dr. Gunby is currently a member of the TMA Alliance and a Patron Member of TEXPAC. He has served as an alternate delegate and delegate member of the TMA House of Delegates since 1988. Dr. Gunby was elected to the Texas Delegation to the AMA in 1999, and for the past eleven years has served as a delegate in the AMA House of Delegates. He is the current secretary of the AMA's Organization of State Medical Association Presidents.

Dr. Gunby has received numerous awards. In 2000, he received the DCMS Charles Max Cole, MD, Leadership Award for outstanding service to the profession of medicine and to the community. In July 2004, he was honored with the Texas Academy of Family Physicians Patient Advocacy Award. This award is presented annually to an individual who demonstrates an outstanding commitment to protecting and advancing the welfare of patients in Texas.

Dr. Gunby has served as the medical director of labor and delivery and assistant chief of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Baylor University Medical Center. He has also served as medical staff president and chair of the Medical Board at Baylor. Dr. Gunby is currently in private practice at Swiss Obstetrics and Gynecology in Dallas.

# Physicians in the Age of Terrorism — Stories of the Battlefield

Chancellor William H. McRaven

The University of Texas System's Chancellor William H. McRaven, a retired U.S. Navy fourstar admiral and leader of one of the nation's largest and most respected systems of higher education, will give his thoughts on the educational system and perspective on the recent history of our nation's security.

# The Speaker

As the chief executive officer of the UT System, Chancellor McRaven oversees 14 institutions that educate 221,000 students and employ 20,000 faculty and more than 80,000 health care professionals, researchers, and staff.

Since becoming chancellor in 2015, McRaven has recommitted the UT System to improving the lives of Texans and people all over the world through education, research, and health care.

McRaven's ambitious vision for the UT System includes nine "Quantum Leaps," that address significant challenges of our time, including building the nation's next generation of leaders through core education in leadership and ethics; leading a brain health revolution by accelerating discoveries and treatments for neurological diseases; elevating higher education's role in national security; driving unprecedented levels of collaboration between higher and K-12 education; and increasing student access and success.

Prior to becoming chancellor, McRaven was the commander of the U.S. Special Operations Command, where he led a force of 69,000 soldiers, and was responsible for conducting counter-terrorism operations worldwide. McRaven is an expert on U.S. foreign policy and has advised presidents George W. Bush and Barack Obama on defense issues.

In 2011, he was the first runner-up for *Time* magazine's Person of the Year and was named Texan of the Year by *The Dallas Morning News*. In 2012, *Foreign Policy* magazine named him one of the nation's Top 10 Foreign Policy Experts. In 2014, *Politico* named McRaven one of the Politico 50.

McRaven was raised mostly in San Antonio. He graduated from UT Austin in 1977 with a degree in journalism, and received his master's degree from the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, Calif. He met his wife, Georgeann, while they were students at UT Austin, and they have three grown children.

Kevin Pho, MD, is an internal medicine physician and a health care social media leader since 2004. Dr. Pho, founder and editor of the popular KevinMD.com blog, will take you through his decade-long social media journey and show how social media can make a profound difference in health care.

# The Speaker

Dr. Kevin Pho is a board-certified internal medicine physician and founder of KevinMD.com, which Forbes called a "must-read health blog." Klout named him the web's top social media influencer in health care and medicine, and CNN named @KevinMD one of its five recommended Twitter health feeds.

He is also co-author of the book, *Establishing, Managing, and Protecting Your Online Reputation: A Social Media Guide for Physicians and Medical Practices.* 

He has been interviewed on the CBS Evening News with Katie Couric, and his commentary regularly appears in *USA Today*, where he is a member of their editorial board of contributors, as well as *CNN* and *The New York Times*. His opinion pieces highlight the challenges doctors face, ranging from the primary care shortage to the epidemic of physician burnout. His dual perspectives as a practicing physician and a health care social media leader highlight his unique journey. He enjoys sharing his story with audiences nationwide through keynote speeches and lectures.

Dr. Pho received his medical degree at Boston University School of Medicine and practices primary care in Nashua, NH. He is a member of the New Hampshire Union Leader's 2010 class of New Hampshire's 40 Under Forty, and a 2013 inductee to the Healthcare Internet Hall of Fame.

Federal law requires us to use our best efforts to collect and report the name, mailing address, occupation, and name of employer of individuals whose contributions exceed \$200 in a calendar year. 
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
