Re: Need to address 2021 Medicare physician payment reductions

Dear Senators Cornyn and Cruz:

On behalf of the Texas Medical Association (TMA) and our more than 53,000 Texas physicians and medical student members, I write urging you to support efforts to prevent cuts to Medicare physician payments and to include these provisions in upcoming end-of-year legislation. The cuts the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) finalized in the 2021 Medicare Physician Fee Schedule will likely (1) further devastate our health care system, which is already stressed by the COVID-19 pandemic, and (2) jeopardize patient access to medically necessary services over the long term.

The 2021 final Medicare Physician Fee Schedule includes several positive attributes, including much-needed payment increases for physicians delivering primary and other essential outpatient and office-based care to some of our nation's most vulnerable patients. These changes should take effect on Jan. 1, 2021, as planned. TMA continues to support these changes.

However, a statutory budget neutrality rule requires that any increases in Medicare payments for these office visits, also known as evaluation and management services, must be offset by corresponding decreases. As a result, many practitioners including surgeons, specialists, therapists, and others face substantial cuts beginning on Jan. 1, 2021.

Physicians continue to reel from the effects of the COVID-19 public health emergency as they continue to serve patients during this global pandemic. The payment cuts finalized by CMS pose a threat to patients and physicians.
